

#### NURSE'S CLINIC: NOTIFICATIONS AND MEDICATIONS

- Sick children must be fever free (less than 100°) for 24 hours without use of medications before returning to school
- Notify clinic of contagious illnesses
- Medications taken once a day should be taken at home; if there is an exception, please see the nurse
- Provide written medical documentation of food allergies (see the Nurse for the form) along with a photo of your child.
- The clinic will need action forms from your child's physician for the following diagnosis:
  - Asthma
  - Diabetes
  - Seizures

- Students cannot carry medication at school, this includes cough drop and aspirin unless approved by doctor (i.e., inhaler)
- Bring Nurse Stubbs:
  - o medication(s), in original container
  - signed medication form

Pre-AP and G/T courses include more projects.

Pre-AP courses prepare students for AP courses in high school.

An AP course is a course that allows you to take a test at the end of the year and receive high school and college credit for the course. Students pay their own fees for the AP test(s).

The Pre-AP/GT course is the <u>same</u> course.

Pre-AP/G/T AND Academic classes are on the college prep. track



### **GT/PRE-AP: ELIGIBILITY**

- Students eligible for the G/T program are eligible for the classes <u>automatically</u>.
- They will receive a letter from the school, in August.
- Students who are not identified for placement in the G/T program, may sign up for Pre-AP courses of their choice.

- Multiple tardies in a 6-week period will result in disciplinary action





#### TRANSPORTATION: WALKERS TO ADJACENT CAMPUSES

- Will be walked daily, by JRMS staff member, to CFHS where student will continue to the meeting place designated by parent/guardian





### **TRANSPORTATION: BUS RIDERS**



Students will stay in their 7<sup>th</sup> period class and listen/watch for their bus number to be called/displayed in the classroom on the Smart board. Buses are lined up in the order they appear on the screen.

Note: JRMS students will ride the bus with secondary schools DLJH (7<sup>th</sup> & 8<sup>th</sup> grade) and CFHS (9<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> grade)

Siblings are able to sit together.



### **TRANSPORTATION: BUS RIDERS (cont.)**



SMART tag system is available for all students.

SMART tag helps increase safety and security for students riding our school buses and will provide live monitoring of student loading and unloading to keep Transportation, school administrators and parents informed.

SMART tag also integrates with other Lamar CISD systems and allows students to use their badges in the cafeteria and to check out books in the library.

# **CELL PHONE POLICY**



Lamar CISD believes that appropriate use of students' technology devices enhances our students' education. Students may use devices in class at the teacher's discretion. Students must follow teacher, campus, and district rules.



Students must adhere to the following rules regarding cell phone use:

- Cell phones must be turned off and cannot be visible on campus during the school day. If the cell phone goes off in the class, it will be taken up by a staff member.
- Students may use devices in class only at the teacher's discretion.
- Placing a cell phone on vibrate or texting is not considered off and *is prohibited.*

- Using a cell phone to record or video tape is prohibited.
- Ear buds, speakers, radios, MP3 players, video or audio recorders, DVD players, cameras, games or other electronic devices should only be visible in the classroom at the teacher's discretion.

If a student needs to make a phone call to parents or guardians, they may do so in the Front Office.

•The private or commercially-sponsored physical activity programs must meet the criteria set by the district as defined in the guidelines established by the TEA. The guidelines are included with the application forms on this web page.

•Application documents, including a Release of Liability form, must be completed and signed by parents/guardians of the participant, the student, the instructor, the school principal and counselor, and the Lamar CISD Athletic Director.

A: No, the band/orchestra department can work with them to find an instrument.


### Q: Are they guaranteed to get their 1<sup>st</sup> choice elective?
